## **SUMMER HOUSING**

### **For Full-Time Students**

Housing is available only to full-time students who are officially registered for summer classes.

**Students registered for 6 or more credits** in a non-weekend program must have already registered as a “full-time” resident student (during the Lottery process) and have signed a Campus Housing Agreement for the 2010-2011 academic year. Students who are taking online courses in conjunction with on-campus courses are also eligible for free summer housing. Students can only receive summer housing **free of cost** if these agreements are made.

**Students registered for no more than 5 credits** are charged \$75.00 per week.

There is no meal plan available during the summer. Students may use the Cougar’s Den or pay at the dining hall when it is open.

## **CLEP EXAMS AND PRIOR LEARNING ASSESSMENT**

College Level Examination Program (CLEP) allows students to demonstrate their knowledge in a wide range of subject areas. CLEP examinations are the standardized tests which measure a person's knowledge of the material covered in introductory college courses. This knowledge may have been obtained through on-the-job experiences, professional workshops, classes at business or technical schools, volunteer activities, or avocational pursuits. CLEP credit is treated as transfer credit and is awarded on a credit/no credit basis. Only passing grades appear on transcripts.

Students may also attempt Prior Learning Assessment by detailing their relevant learning in a written document called a portfolio. Students will work with an academic advisor and the Dean, Center for Adult and Continuing Education.

## **ONLINE LEARNING AND TECHNOLOGY REQUIREMENTS**

Online learning is a learn-by-doing method of acquiring knowledge. Rather than sitting in a classroom and listening, you will be at your computer reading, participating in online discussions and chats, and researching the Mary Kintz Bevevino Library's electronic databases. Online learning is active learning!

Online courses are challenging and exciting. It will be important to stay on schedule and complete your assignments on time. This format is for adults who are crunched for time and have a strong desire to continue their education.

Here are some key points for you to consider before you take an online course:

- Set goals for yourself—what do you expect from taking an online course?
- Plan to connect your life experiences with your education and course work.
- Your class work will be both individual and group based.
- Constructive feedback from instructors and classmates is a vital component to online learning.
- A moderate amount of computer literacy is expected.

## **ABOUT YOUR COMPUTER**

- You should have at least a Pentium III processor, but a Pentium IV would be best.
- You should have at least 256 Mb of RAM memory, but 1Gb would be best.
- Your Internet connection should be reliable. A dial-up or 56k modem connection is adequate, but a “broadband” DSL or Cable connection to the Internet would be best.
- Microsoft Office is the supported productivity software at Misericordia. Files created in Works or WordPerfect are not accepted.
- You should have Adobe Acrobat Reader loaded on your computer.
- Internet Explorer and FireFox are the supported web browsers with which your online courses will work well. Keep your web browser updated.
- You should scan your computer for viruses on a weekly basis.
- Students should check their Blackboard compatibility prior to enrolling in online classes. To do so, go to the “My Courses” tab in e-MU and click on the Blackboard link.

## HOW TO LOG ON TO e-MU

Before you can access e-MU, you must be registered for a class.

### **If you are on the Campus Network...**

1. Open your browser and go to <http://emu.misericordia.edu>.
2. Enter your User ID. This is the same ID as your current email user name. For example, Mary Augustine is `augustim` (first 7 letters of last name and first initial).
3. Enter your password, which is composed of the initials of your first and last name plus the last four digits of your social security number (SS#). Mary's password would be `ma1234`, assuming the last four digits of her SS# are 1234.
4. You will then be prompted to enter a new password. Remember to write down this new password if it is one you have never used before!

### **If you are off campus...**

1. Connect to your Internet Service Provider, such as EPIX, AOL, Earthlink, etc. (If you are an AOL user, connect to AOL and minimize the AOL window. Then open Internet Explorer as your browser).
2. Open your browser and go to <http://emu.misericordia.edu>.
3. Enter your User ID. This is the same ID as your current email user name. For example, Mary Augustine is `augustim`.
4. Enter your password, which is the initials of your first and last name plus the last four digits of your social security number (SS#). Mary's password would be `ma1234`, assuming the last four digits of her SS# are 1234.
5. You will then be prompted to enter a new password. Remember to write down this new password if it is one you have never used before!

### **Notes On e-MU Email**

1. Your email address will not change. Using student Mary Augustine as an example, her email address is still `augustim@misericordia.edu`.
2. The e-MU email server is extremely powerful. In testing, we have noticed a marked improvement in accessing individual email accounts. However, please keep in mind that your experience is dependent on the speed of your computer, as well as the speed of your Internet connection.

# HEALTH CARE INFORMATICS CERTIFICATE PROGRAM

## OVERVIEW

Health Care Informatics is an emerging specialty that focuses on how technology is used in the delivery of health care services. Informatics has made many contributions to the health care environment in recent years: applications of technology to administrative and financial transactions, such as billing and inventory control; a virtual explosion of health-related information available to consumers via the internet; and gains in making syntheses in evidence, practice guidelines, and health evidence research more accessible to health professionals, researchers, and patients.

Informatics has begun to be applied more to the clinical realm, as well as through such applications as reminder and decision support systems, order entry systems, telemedicine, teleradiology, on-line prescribing and email.

Designed for professionals in the fields of nursing, medical imaging, occupational therapy, physical therapy, management information systems, information technology, and business, the Health Care Informatics certificate seeks to assist those already employed in the field to improve their educational background and skills, thereby increasing job mobility.

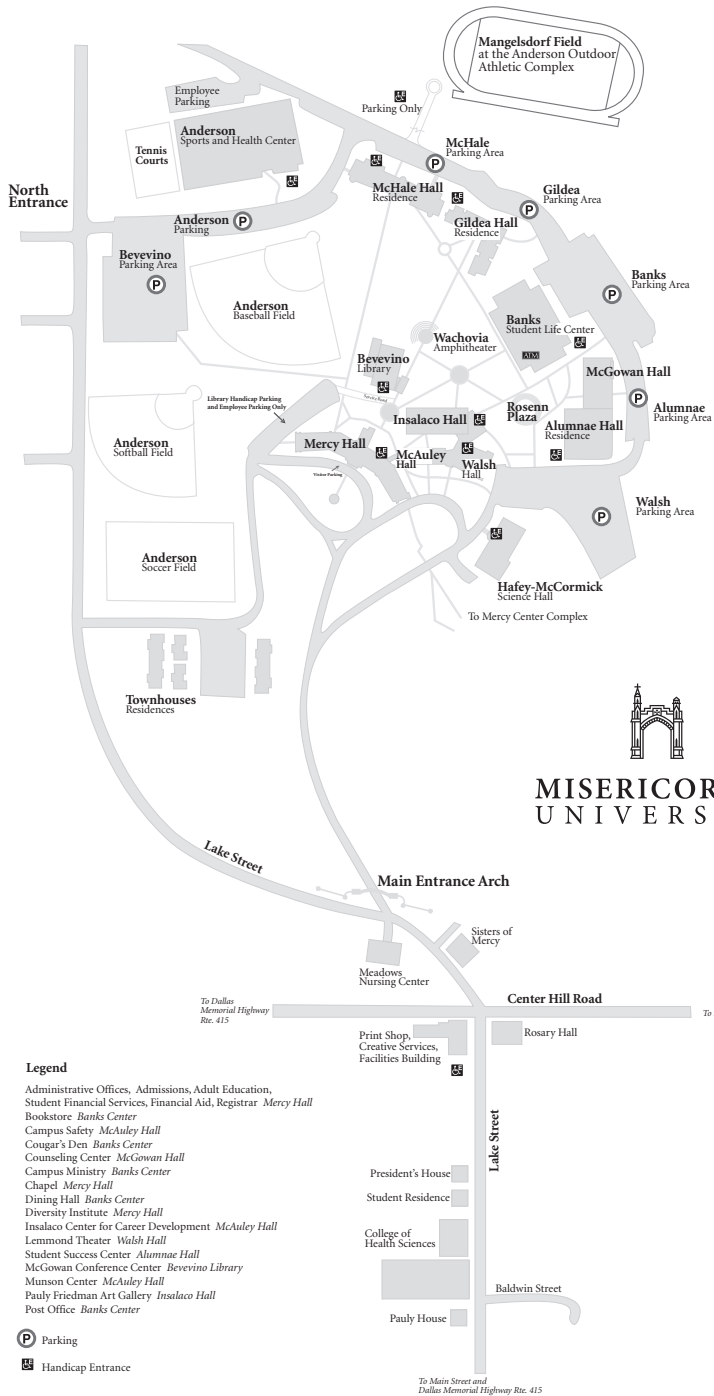
