accommodate changes that have been necessary due to Covid-19, but we take pride in our ability to continue to serve our Misericordia community.

You will notice that the library furniture has been arranged for social distancing purposes, and we ask that you please do not rearrange the furniture. Also, cleaning supplies are located on each floor of the library to allow everyone to clean and disinfect high touch surfaces before and after use. You will find hand sanitizer throughout the library, but especially at the printing station on the first floor.

Study Rooms

The library has 10 study rooms available to reserve for student use. On the second floor, students can choose from the Center for Nursing History or one of the eight rooms around the perimeter of the second floor. Due to Covid-19 and social distancing requirements, the multimedia room on the first floor has also been converted to a study room.

All 10 study rooms can be reserved for two-hour blocks of time. Due to Covid-19, each study room now has a capacity limit, and the furniture has been arranged in each room to accommodate the capacity numbers. Students are asked to not rearrange the furniture in each room. Room capacities are listed on the outside of each room and noted on the room reservation system on the library's webpage. Students are asked to please follow these guidelines.

Whiteboard markers and erasers are available for check out at the Circulation Desk on the first floor for use in the rooms with whiteboard walls. Look for virtual library programming announcements on the portal. Our Roving Reference program has been redesigned as a Library and Writing Center Virtual Café. More information on the virtual café can be found posted in the library and around campus or send an email to Liz Kavanaugh at ekavanaugh@misericordia.edu.

Finally, it is so important to remember to wear your mask when you are in the library. The only exception to this rule that we can allow is if you are alone in one of the study rooms with the door closed. Otherwise, masks are required. Your mask protects me, and my mask protects you.

These items are thoroughly cleaned and disinfected after each circulation.

To reserve a room, simply click on the "Reserve a Room" link on the library's webpage. You will need to have a Misericordia email address to make the reservation. The rules and capacity limits are also listed on the reservation page. If you have any questions, please stop by the Circulation Desk on the first floor.

There is an additional study room located on the third floor of the library that is not listed on the library's study room reservation system. The Heritage Room is located in the area of the McGowan Room. This room has a capacity of four people. Use of this room is first come, first served, and there are no time limits.

Until further notice, the McGowan Room on the third floor has been converted to a classroom. Unfortunately, when classes are not in session in this room, the room will be locked and not available for student use.



Student Posters Debut in Misericordia Digital Commons By Maureen Cech, University Archivist and Special Collections Librarian



Student Research Poster Day is a spring tradition at Misericordia when (primarily) graduating seniors from each college share the results of semester- and year-long research projects with the campus community. Students—many assisting their faculty mentors have the opportunity to explain their findings and describe research challenges and surprises in a conference-like poster session.

In an effort to maintain the spirit of the Poster

Day during the challenging Spring 2020 semester, Vice President of Academic Affairs Dr. David Rehm sought a virtual solution: place the posters into Misericordia Digital Commons, the University's open-access institutional repository (IR).

Depositing work into an institutional repository offers several advantages to students. Institutional repositories provide a stable digital environment from which students and new graduates can share their research with graduate schools and potential employers. Student work in IRs demonstrates an institution's commitment to student scholarship and highlight the opportunities available to students to work alongside faculty researchers.


With 79 posters from 6 departments submitted in Spring 2020, the Student Research Poster Presentations series in Misericordia Digital Commons offers a glimpse into the community of scholarship of which Misericordia is proud. Now that community has global exposure. The IR is crawled by Google and other search engines. Users have reached Misericordia Digital Commons through Google and Google Scholar more than any other source.


Items from the Student Posters series have been downloaded over 3350 times in 78 countries, by individuals and 228 institutions, including the Department of Veterans Affairs, Halliburton Company, and several hospital systems.

Student scholarship is visible alongside faculty and staff scholarship in Misericordia Digital Commons. Posters have their own series, but are also archived in department and program series.

Returning to a semester like none other, Fall 2020 also welcomed the return of the library's chat service. The chat service is just one of the library's many virtual services that have been highlighted since March and the onset of COVID-19 precautions. Meeting the campus community where they are (in many cases, online) in order to provide research assistance has been key in ensuring the continuity of library services regardless of where the researcher and the library staff member are physically located.

The "Click Here to Chat!" slide-out is featured prominently in the upper right corner, and is available Monday-Friday from noon until 4:00 p.m. As the semester rolls along and its popularity increases, additional hours may be added. Currently staffed by a team of librarians and library staff members, opportunities to chat can be found on every main page of the library's new website. Chat services are ideal for questions that require shorter responses, such as those that are typically found when socially chatting via text or instant messenger on a mobile device. Recently, chat questions have included:


What are your hours today?


