The Speech-Language Pathology Clinic and Summer Camp for Students

The Speech, Language and Hearing Center at Misericordia University is a comprehensive facility serving the residents of Northeastern Pennsylvania. Located on the second floor of Mercy Hall on the Misericordia University campus, the center provides a full range of diagnostic and speech, language, and hearing services for individuals of all ages, newborn through geriatric. Hearing screenings and audiological rehabilitation services are also available.

These services are provided by undergraduate and graduate student clinicians working toward their master's degree in Speech-Language Pathology at Misericordia University. In the clinic, student clinicians are given the opportunity to evaluate and diagnose individuals with speech and language disorders. In addition, they design and implement treatment programs for individuals with communication disorders under the direct supervision of faculty and staff certified by the American Speech-Language-Hearing Association (ASHA) and licensed by the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

In an effort to provide students with additional information regarding Misericordia University's Speech-Language Pathology Program as well as the profession itself, the Department of Speech-Language Pathology hosts a 3-day, 2-night residential Career Exploration Camp for interested junior and senior high school students every summer. The cost is \$75.00. During the camp, students will have an opportunity to experience life on the campus and interact with faculty, staff, and students who are currently involved in the Speech-Language Pathology program. Students will also visit local health care facilities where speech-language pathologists

conduct therapy. The students tour the facilities and learn about the speech-language pathologists' responsibilities in that particular setting. Social activities that will facilitate career exploration in a casual setting will also take place on campus and in the community.



he Speech-Language Pathology Department at Misericordia University is one of only three 5-year undergraduate and graduate programs in the country that lead to a Master of Science degree in Speech-Language Pathology. The vision of the Speech-Language Pathology Department is to develop a sound research program that integrates clinical practica with quality teaching.

This is an exciting period of growth for our Program. We would like to highlight a few of our notable accomplishments. Applications to our undergraduate and graduate Program are at an all-time high. This year, for the first time, five of our students will be presenting research at state and national conferences. Our students have also been actively involved in service activities through the National Student Speech-Language Hearing Association (NSSLHA) and have been awarded the 2007 National Chapter Honors by NSSLHA. They will receive the award at the 2007 National American Speech-Language Hearing Association Convention in Boston in November. Our faculty have also successfully published papers and obtained grants to equip a research laboratory with advanced equipment

for assessing and treating various communicative disorders.

Apart from some of the accomplishments noted above, the Department has recently hired Dr. Ruixia Yan as a tenure-track assistant professor. Dr. Yan completed her doctorate in Communicative Disorders from the University of Louisiana at Lafayette in May of 2007. Her areas of interest include language testing/assessment, normal speech and language development in a first language, second language acquisition and teaching, child language disorders, multilingualism in communicative disorders, autism spectrum disorders, semiotics, statistics, and research methods. The Department is also recruiting another tenuretrack faculty in the areas of Child Language and Augmentative and Alternative Communication (AAC) and/or neurogenic communicative disorders. The addition of Dr. Yan and another new faculty member will enhance the Department's strengths in fluency disorders, voice disorders, and speech science. In the fall of 2007, Misericordia University will

Insight into fieldwork from a MU alumnae

The field of Speech-Language Pathology is not as simple as the therapy techniques used, or even the progress made in therapy. It is about changing the lives of your patients. We change lives by believing in our patients and giving them a chance, even after everyone else has given up hope. Often, patients will amaze you with their vast improve-ments and abilities to achieve heights that you never realized they could achieve—because *you* gave them the chance. Be prepared to advocate for your patients when you work with schools administrators, families, nurses, doctors, therapists, and funding agencies who may not agree with allowing your patient the device he or she needs to succeed.

Be prepared for patients who will refuse therapy and want nothing to do with you. They will tell you to "go away," "be quiet," and call you some not-too-pleasing names. Do not take it personally, but spend the time getting to know them. Initially, you will have to push yourself to be more creative and gain rapport with your patient. Once you gain your patient's trust, therapy gets a lot more fun and less stressful.

Interning helped me to develop a true passion for being a speech-language pathologist. Everything "clicked" and I finally understood the amazing things we do and how exciting our field truly can be. *Everyday* there is something new to learn, something changing, and something surprising. Knowing *you* helped improve the quality of your patients' lives will make your job worthwhile. Most importantly, have fun! If you are bored so is your patient, so laugh and joke around, and be yourself!

Initially, fieldwork is not going to be easy. You will get frustrated and wonder why you chose this challenging field of Speech-Language Pathology. However, at the end of the first week, you will look back on everything you have accomplished and learned and how much fun you had along the way and you will *know* these are the incentives behind your choice.
