Charles joined the College Misericordia staff in January 1967, as the Acquisitions Librarian. Over the next 36 years he served in various capacities including, Director, Acting Director, and most recently as Acquisitions Librarian, until his retirement in April 2003.

Charles was a 1961 graduate of GAR Memorial High School in Wilkes-Barre. In 1965 he graduated from Wilkes University, with a B.A. Degree in French. In 1966, Charles received his Master's Degree in Library Science from the University of Pittsburg and then went on to receive a second Masters Degree in Psychology from the University of Scranton.

The library homepage is an excellent place to to our library's research databases, which explore the many resources and services offered at the Bevevino Library.

What can I find on the library homepage?

Not only can you find a variety of information resources on the library homepage, which are available both in the library and remotely, you can also get to know the library, its' staff and its' different departments, including the services that they provide.

By clicking on the *Library Catalogs* link, you are able to access the Bevevino Library's online catalog, as well as the online catalogs of other local libraries, the Pennsylvania State Library, the Library of Congress, and libraries worldwide.

Under the *Research* link, you will find links

may be used to search for abstracts of journal and newspaper articles, full-text journal articles, and book articles. Examples of research databases that can be found at the Bevevino Library include: Academic Search Elite, CINAHL, and the MLA International Bibliography, just to name a few. Most of these databases may be accessed off-campus as well. In addition to the research databases, there is a link specifically designed for faculty use, to provide assistance with plagiarism issues, and to provide information regarding the library's instruction program.

Other resources that are available in the Research section of the homepage include: library help guides, a webliography of recommended Internet sites, writing help, a link to the college's Writing Center, and a link to full-text online journals. The online journals, listed alphabetically by title, vary as to the availability of off-campus access.

The Center for Nursing History at College Misericordia

The Center for Nursing History at College Misericordia opened on April 29, 2005, and is the premier site to display, collect, and preserve nursing history and memorabilia from Northeast Pennsylvania. The center was founded by two of the oldest nursing programs in the region, the Wilkes-Barre General Hospital School of Nursing (1887-1974) and the Nursing Department at College Misericordia (1949-present). The Center for Nursing History at College Misericordia offers three display cases exhibiting photographs, nursing uniforms, pins, and other memorabilia donated by the Wilkes-Barre General Hospital School of Nursing Alumni Association and the Nursing Department at College Misericordia. The Center is located in the Bevevino Library on the second floor, and is open to the public during regular library hours. The Center works in conjunction with the Sister Mary Carmel McGarigle Archives, and collects nursing memorabilia and oral history interviews from nurses, local



The Sister Mary Carmel McGarigle Archives actively collects all College Misericordia memorabilia, information about student activities, alumni events. college traditions, department and office files, photographs, audio/visual recordings, college publications, and scrapbooks. Archival displays throughout the Library can be viewed during regular library hours. The Archives works in collaboration with the Luzerne County Historical Society to collect photographs and oral histories from the Back Mountain region.
